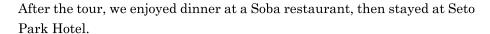
An old ceramics factory of the Meiji era had been relocated to the Setokura Museum.

How do you paint?

Glassy White 玻璃白 Betty HO

I have bought some Glassy White 玻璃白 in Jengdezhen, the birth place of porcelain in China, and I find it very useful for painting. I want to share my experience in using it with you. In fact those who have attended my demonstration in JPAC Convention2016 have been given a small package of glassy white and I want you to try it.

Glassy white is a kind of painting powder which is white and opaque before and after firing. Moreover, we can achieve a relief like effect if we apply it with a thick consistency either water based or oil based.

The following is information on how we can use it:

1. Glassy white can be used as texture paste

Mix it to a creamy consistency with either water based or oil based medium. Then we can use it to create raised dots or outlines with appropriate tools. I usually use a toothpick inserted in a pen holder to create the dots or do scratching. With the pen holder, I can control better.



The outline was painted with glassy white with a syringe. After firing, metallic gold was applied on top of them.

The dots on the border was painted with glassy white.





Pen holder with tooth pick. The tooth pick is used to do scratching technique and creating dots on paintings.

2. Glassy white can be used as white relief paint and help to make highlight



Glassy white is painted on top of the paints of the petals and put on the pistil to highlight the hydrangea.



The raised snow was painted with glassy white.

3. Glassy white can be mixed with other paints to become a pastel color

We can create pastel colors by adding glassy white to the paints. We can create a pastel color chart ourselves. Do pay special attention when we mix glassy white with red. The red color may turn muddy or burn out during firing because glassy white contains lead and it will "eat' reds. It is necessary that we do test fire before using the paint in a painting.

4. Glassy white can also serve as the base for paints to create a pastel color feel and a relief effect

Colors blended on top of the glassy white have a pastel feel after firing and the images with glassy white as base raise up like relief. This is in fact a very traditional painting technique of China called Fencai 粉彩. To do this technique, firstly we apply the glassy white on our painting using water based medium. Wait till it dry and blend colors on top of the glassy white using oil based medium. All is done in one firing. We can also choose to fire the glassy white first and blend the colors on top in the second firing. Applying glassy white as base is one of the most important technique employed in the whole process of color applying. If the glassy white is not applied well, the painting result after firing will be greatly and directly affected. To apply well, Chinese traditional artists used a very clever technique. Firstly we grind the glassy white into very fine pigment. Then mix it with water. Add water drop by drop. Mix it until it becomes thick paste. Secondly, we use the paste to build a "dam" on a small saucer. On the left of the "dam" we put clear water. When we are ready to paint, we dip the tip of our brush in the clear water and then swirled our brush on the right side of the "dam". We swirl our brush until the glassy white flows more quickly to the rim of the saucer than before. Now we can apply the glassy

white stroke by stroke on the area where glassy white is needed. We have

to sweep softly with the brush before the glassy white becomes dry. Glassy white should be applied close to the outlines but without covering them.

I have demonstrated this technique in JPAC Convention 2016.



The magnolias are with glassy white as base under the different values of green.

This is my sharing with you on glassy white. Do give it a try and you would love it. Enjoy painting with it.
